II- Defination:

1. Course of Study: Course of study indicates pursuance of study in a Bachelor of Arts (Civil Services) discipline.

2. Discipline Specific Core (DSC): Discipline Specific Core is a course of study, which shall be pursued by a student as a mandatory requirement of the program of study. The DSCs specified in the undergraduate program curriculum framework would be identified by the concern department as core courses to be taught in a program.

3. Discipline Specific Elective (DSE): The discipline Specific Electives (DSEs) shall be a pool of credit courses of that particular discipline, which a student chooses to study from his/her particular discipline(s). There shall be a pool of DSEs from which a student may choose a course of study. The DSEs specified in the framework would be identified by the concern department as Elective Course to be taught in the program. 4. Subject/School Specific Course (SSC): The Subject Specific Course as Major is built on intensive specialization in Multidisciplinary domain while the choice of School Specific Course as Major is based on school concept (i.e. inter-disciplinary studies) Thus the choice of SSC as major mandatorily require choosing three inter-related subjects in that faculty/discipline.

5. Generic Elective (GE) or Open elective (OE): Generic elective shall be apol of courses which is meant to provide multidisciplinary or interdisciplinary education to students. GE/OE shall consists of pool of courses offered by various disciplines of study(excluding the GE offered by parent discipline) in a group of odd and even semesters, from which a student can choose. The GE/OEs specified in the framework would be identified by the concerned department as GEs/OEs to be taught in a program.

6. Ability Enhancement course (AEC), Skill Enhancement course(SEC) and Value Addition course (VAC): These three courses shall be a pool of courses offered by all the Departments in groups of odd and even semesters from which student can choose.

(i) AEC courses are the courses based upon the content that leads to knowledge enhancement through various areas of study. They are language and Literature and Environmental Science and Sustainable Development which will be mandatory for all discipline.

(ii) SEC courses are skill based courses in all disciplines and are aimed at providing hand on training, competencies, skill etc.SEC courses may be chosen from a pool of courses designed to provide skill bases instruction.

(iii) VEC courses are value based Education courses which are meant to inculcate ethics, culture, constitutional values, soft skills, sports education and such similar values to students which will help in all round development of students.

(iv) Major discipline: A course which should compulsorily be studied by the student as a requirement of core or major subject is termed as Core Course. A student pursuing undergraduate programme in a specific discipline (Core course) shall be awarded appropriate degree with Major in a discipline on completion of VI or VIII Semester according to the course of study selected by a student.

(v) Minor discipline: A course should be used to bring focus on multidisciplinary education during the course of study. The student choosing core subjects (DSC) may choose minors from the faculty/discipline unrelated to major but something that complements the major.

(vi) Academic Credit: An Academic Credit is a unit by which the course work (Theory/Practical/Training) is measured. It determines the number of hours of instructions required for duration of Semester (13 - 15 Weeks). One credit is equivalent to 15 Hours of teaching instructions (Theory Lectures or Tutorials) or 30 Hours of practical or Flied work or community engagement and service per semester. A minimum of 15 hours of teaching per credit in a semester along with 30 hours of out of class activities such as preparation for classes/lessons, which form a part of course work and independent reading and study has to be performed by each faculty. The out of class activities are not measures and quantified for purpose of grading credit.
